This month I would like to talk about my wife's favorite book, which she reads this almost every morning. She has found that you can just open it up and read a section, and it will inspire you to think of the world in a different way. The book is written by Pema Chodron, a Buddhist nun. She also the resident teacher at Gampo Abby, Cape Breton, Nova Scotia. It's the first Tibetan monastery in North America established for Westerners.

This book offers standalone readings to help cultivate compassion and awareness of everyday life. They were compiled from her teachings at the abbey. She has written a number of other books including *When Things Fall Apart*, *Heart Advise for Different Times*, and *The Places that Scare You*.

One of my favorite sections in this is 'Communicating from the Heart'. This is a quote taken from the book, "We have a strong tendency to distance ourselves from our experience because it hurts, but the dharma provides encouragement to move closer to the experience." Although there are lots of words that could be used to explain compassionate action. I'd like to stress the word communication-in particular, communication from the heart.

There are 65 sections to this book, and each section is very to the point and easily understood. Each can be used in our daily life. This book has helped me focus on everyday life. I hope that this is helpful to you.

Sunday Services

10/06/19 Speaker: Santosh Kamath

Background: Raised to be generally “self-reliant”, Santosh has academic education mostly in STEM subjects, with degrees in Chemistry (Synthetic and Theoretical Organic focus) and Mathematics (statistics minor), leading to careers in Aerospace (Technical and Management, designing and developing radar software and firmware for military), Appropriate Technology (Agriculture, Aquaculture, Alternative Energy), Speculative Trading, Teaching (Math, Chemistry, Physics, conversations German and Russian), and Higher Education Administration (Adaptive Technology and Institutional Research).

Topic: “CREDO”

Summary: Credo (*New Oxford American Dictionary*) – Statement of the beliefs or aims which guide someone’s actions. Why? Our words and actions are based on our belief systems, generally inherited osmotically from family, society, affiliations (secular, political, religious, etc.). Unless we consciously explore our beliefs, we operate in a knee-jerk fashion to stimuli and voices in our heads.

10/13/19 Speaker: Melina Rayna Barratt

Background: Melina, a longtime activist for feminist and LGBTQ issues, is a Legislative Director for the Florida National Organization for Women and President of the Gainesville Area NOW.

Topic: “An Update on the ERA in Florida.”

10/20/19 Speaker: Lucille Tomkins Davis

Background: Born and raised in Washington, DC., worked as a Speech Language Pathologist and Educational advocate for the District of Columbia Public Schools and the Prince George’s County Maryland Public Schools. Retired after forty years in public education. She is now happily, retired in Florida with her husband Larry Davis.

Topic: “The Diary of a Slave”

Summary: Her great-great Uncle Adam Francis Plummer was a slave in Prince George’s County Maryland. He kept a diary for 64 years, from 1841 until his death in 1905. He wrote in this journal during and after his bondage. In her presentation, she shares her life-changing and life-defining experience of connecting and finding family members through this document. For nearly a century no one knew for sure that the diary – a personal history of the Maryland slave named Adam Francis Plummer really existed. But on August 13, 2003 this priceless work was presented to the Smithsonian Institution in Washington, DC. The event also marked a homecoming for extended Plummer family, a group torn apart by slavery and reconnected through his writings.

10/27/19 Speaker: Dr. Tom Hibberd

Background: Tom is a clinical psychologist in private practice in Inverness, Florida. He is also a member and official playwright of NCUU.

Summary: “The Mexican Day of the Dead Ceremony: What Can We Learn and Use From It?”

All NCUU members are invited to participate in our "Day of the Dead" celebration, as a combined Sunday Service and potluck on October 27.

In Mexico people celebrate this version of Halloween by taking the whole family for a picnic to the local graveyard to share a meal with their departed loved one. It is a way of experiencing the love that holds a family (or friends) together, even beyond the separation of death.

For our "Day of the Dead" ceremony, please bring a dish of food or a quantity of drink, to share with the community, just as you would for a Potluck. However make this offering something special a beloved deceased relative or friend would have loved to share in. Place your offering on the table around our Altar.

During the service each participant will be called upon to tell the community, in one or two sentences, what food they have brought, which loved one is being honored, and why that food was selected.

Example: "I brought a steak and mushroom pie for my Dad, Robert Hibberd, because he always loved pie."

As soon as the service is over we will all sit and eat together, as in a regular potluck, in love and fellowship.
