This Month, I would like to discuss loving kindness. It's Buddhist term which relations to mindful practice designed to increase love and compassion first to ourselves, and then to our love ones and the to our friends.

Practicing loving kindness is like saying a prayer for yourself or someone else. You actively send loving and kind wishes to yourself or others, and recite in your mind words and phrases that express good will toward yourself or other. When I have a negative thought about a loved one, I then try to think of a positive thought to balance the negative thought. To start, choose a person to send loving kindness toward. You can start with yourself or with somebody you love. You can sit stand or lie down, begin by breathing slowly and deeply. Open the palm of your hands, and then bring the person to mind. Radiate loving kindness by reciting a set of warm wishes, such as 'May you be happy' or a phrase of your choosing. Repeat the phrase slowly continue until you feel the loving kindness toward that person. Start with the people you love and then you can expanse to friends and difficult people and finally to all beings.

5/19/19 Speakers: Mike Goss

Background: Michael Goss is a former Central Intelligence Agency officer who served 24 years in various senior leadership capacities across the CIA. He achieved Senior Intelligence Service rank, which is CIA's version of a Flag Officer. He is also a former Naval Intelligence Officer who commanded several Navy intelligence units. His first exposure to Islam was as Executive Officer, US Navy Anti-Terrorist Alert Center in 1989.

He earned a Bachelor of Science from Texas A&M and an MBA from UCLA. He also did graduate work in advanced computer science for a year at Carnegie Mellon.

<u>Topic:</u> "Political Islam – Implications for Unitarians"

<u>Summary:</u> Islam is a religious, cultural and political system. It's based on core beliefs followed by its adherents, but with varying degrees of devotion, as is the case for any religion. The presentation focuses on Political Islam, which is that part of Islam that impacts non-Muslims such as Christians, Jews, and atheists.

5/26/19 <u>Speaker:</u> Adele Jacobson with Cheryl Black

Background: Adele was raised in Colorado by parents who loved music and who encouraged her to play in the school band. This essentially led her to the classical guitar and now the mountain dulcimer.
