Happy New Year NCUU! We begin what promises to be a challenging and uncertain 2024 with the good news of welcoming several energetic and talented new members.

In the month of January, we will celebrate Martin Luther King's birthday by participating in events in Inverness and Crystal River as we did last year. This will be followed by Black History month in February. These are very special times for UUs to enhance their awareness, empathy -and love- by becoming fully woke. I know that most UUs are already there to a greater extent than most Floridians, but it is always enriching to learn more. To that end, I encourage reading the book The 1619 Project (ISBN 978-0-593-23057-2), a compendium of contributions by numerous Black authors orchestrated by Nicole Hannah-Jones. Or pay a virtual visit to the Washington, DC Smithsonian *National Museum of African American History and Culture* (https://nmaahc.si.edu). Our region of Florida needs the illumination of enlightened Unitarian Universalists.

In the months ahead, we will begin the pursuit of a paid position for a quarter-time minister utilizing funds from the bequest to NCUU from Reverend Mary Louise DeWolf following the approval by the Board of Directors at its November 21 meeting. All who may be interested in participating in the search process are invited to step up. As we pointed out in the last newsletter, the UUA recently released its final proposal for revision of Article II of the UUA Bylaws and this will be voted on at the UUA General Assembly this coming Spring. Sunday, Jan. 7, 2024

Speaker – UU Rev Katie Culbert



Unitarian Universalist minister Rev. Katie Culbert served the UU Church of Tampa as Director of Religious Exploration for many years and was intern minister at the UU Church of Sarasota, where she was ordained. She has crafted worship services and preached for congregations in Florida and around the country. The current focus of her ministry is pastoral care, most recently working as a Chaplain at Tampa General Hospital. Katie lives in Tampa with her two teenage sons.

Topic: "Southern Fried Transcendentalism"

"Southern Fried Transcendentalism" - One of the best-selling books of all time, Where The Crawdads Sing by Delia Owens, is a story of a young "marsh girl" who overcomes great adversity living alone in the swamps of North Carolina. Southern culture is deeply connected to self-reliance and the natural world in a way that resembles transcendentalism, a 19th century New England philosophy shaped by Ralph Waldo Emerson, Henry David Thoreau and Margaret Fuller. Where is the connection between the intellectual and idealistic world view that influenced modern day Unitarian Universalism and the spirituality of the marsh girl?

Speaker – Judi Siegal



Judi is a native of Connecticut and frequent speaker to the UU's. She is a graduate of Adelphi University and is a retired Jewish educator. Many remember her column on Judaism which ran for several years in the Citrus County Chronicle and the Marion Citizen. She is active in her community and enjoys reading and visiting historical places. She has three grandchildren who are the joy of her life.

Topic: "Antisemitism: A journey from its earliest history unto the present day"

Today's speaker will be presenting a brief history of anti-Semitism from early history to the present day, including current events in Israel, with attention to Jewish discrimination in the State of Florida. We will explore why anti-Semitism exists and what we can do to stop hatred of Jews and the Jewish way of life. This topic affects all people of good will as we journey through the topic noting what happens to one group of people can easily happen to another.

Sunday, Jan. 21, 2024

Speaker – Rev Marcia McCartney



Rev. Marcia McCartney's passion is supporting humanity in rediscovering the part each of us plays in our Divine Oneness. For over 30 years, she has been a spiritual midwife for people who desire to deepen and expand their experience of life with the Infinite Creative Spirit within. As a Unity Minister, she has encouraged the practice of Spiritual Truth taught by the great mystical traditions. She has served as senior minister of three Unity ministries in Chicago, Gainesville and Citrus County, Florida. As a recovering addict of 45 years, she has walked the path of surrender, acceptance and recovery. She became a Licensed Unity Teacher in 1992 and an Ordained Unity Minister in 1999. As an Agent of Conscious Evolution, Attitudinal Healing and Sage-ing International facilitator she created an alternative ministry based on healing play, laughter and creativity: The Planetary Play Project (www.planetaryplayproject.org). Rev McCartney currently

lives in Crystal River with fur babies Joey and Sophie.

Topic: "I See A World."

NCUU Hikes - January

Schedule Change for January: Instead of hiking during the second week of the month, let's hike on the 7-Mile Loop Trail at Crystal River Preserve State Park. The park will have a 1st Day Hike on Monday, 1 January. There are several distances, 1, 3, or 7 miles, and those hikes will start a little after 8 am. Hikers do not have to go with one of those groups. The event actually lasts until 11 am, so we can start at 10 and hike out-and-back, probably 2.5 - 3 miles total. Well-behaved dogs on a leash are welcome.

Directions: From US Hwy 19, just north of the town of Crystal River, go west on State Park St, until the pavement ends (do not turn left on Sailboat Ave.). Continue straight ahead on the dirt road a few hundred feet until you reach a small parking area, or you can park along the dirt road. Come celebrate the New Year outdoors!
